This year, CCALS welcomed Dr. Suzana Makowski to our staff Dr Makowski will expand our mission by providing clinical support to our clients. She is a Palliative Care Doctor who has worked and collaborated with CCALS for over 15 years and brings a new expertise to our team. She provides a physician's perspective to our

staff members, educational programs, and relationships with medical organizations.

"Many people think palliative care is just hospice, but this role is far beyond that. My approach is to provide alleviation of suffering and symptom management for anyone living with a serious illness such as ALS. This disease is far more complex than physical ramifications and can affect someone's sense of self, sense of their future, sense of hope, or their role in society, and I think CCALS provides support in all those aspects like no other organization."

Dr. Makowski has already made an impact on our CCALS community. She is currently teaching high school students at the Harley School in Rochester, NY on an end of life elective. As part of their class, they have already committed to volunteer at the CCALS Stroll & Roll in May and meet one of our families to gain a deeper perspective on ALS.

Her work goes beyond the borders of CCALS to ensure each patient continues to invest in their personal well-being. As a former professor at University of Massachusetts, one of her students approached her with a capstone project to honor their mother who was a CCALS patient. The pair are currently collaborating with local art museums to arrange discounted tickets for ALS patients and caregivers.

Dr. Makowski is quickly establishing partnerships with hospice teams and universities to educate students and professionals on living with ALS and end of life care with a patientcentered approach. This new approach will increase quality of life to the greatest extent possible. Her role is invaluable in developing specific care plans as we strive to provide the most high quality, appropriate care to our families.
